VACANT HOUSES BY WARD

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To inform the Committee on the position regarding the numbers of vacant house in each of the wards in the Committee's area.

ISSUE

- 1. There are a number of known vacant houses in the Brierfield and Reedley Committee's wards. These houses are a wasted resource, attract anti-social behaviour and detract from the amenity of the area.
- 2. The Committee have asked for the number of vacant properties in each of the wards covered by the Committee to be reported to them.
- 3. The Empty Property Loan scheme was extended to cover all areas of the Borough in 2014 and we have received 97 applications for assistance with 21 being in the Brieffield and Reedley Committee wards. However we are finding that when we have provided schedules of work properties are being improved and the financial assistance is not being taken up.
- 4. There are currently 158 empty residential properties in Briefield and Reedley Committee area which represents 3.9% of the housing stock covered by the Committees wards
- 5. The table below shows the number of empty properties in each ward for over 2 years and over 6 months up to 2 years.

6. The owners of all these empty houses have been written to and the Empty Homes Officers from Private Sector Housing is constantly monitoring the properties and in contact with the owners and they are being encouraged to take bring the property back into use. Where owners inform us of their intention to renovate the property we offer loan assistance and monitor the house to ensure that the renovations proceed and do not stall.
