Pendle Profile 2021

- * Pendle is the 36th most deprived area in England
- * Pendle has the 3rd highest percentage of common mental health disorders in Lancashire
- * 13% of fire and rescue activity was deliberate ASB fire related
- * Pendle has a higher than Lancashire average rate of violent crime hospital admissions

Pendle Profile 2021

- * Although numbers remain relatively small, numbers of seriously injured older car occupant casualties are increasing in Pendle.
- * **Theft offences** were the most commonly reported crime group in relation to repeat victimisation, followed by **violence against the person**.
- * **Domestic abuse** accounted for 16% of repeat victimisation.
- * **Alcohol** was a factor in at least 12% of offences where a repeat victim was involved.

Pendle Profile 2021

- * All serious violence crime types increased during 2020 compared to 2019 except for robbery
- * Suspects in Pendle were on average 34.4 years old
- * 13.7% of suspects were intoxicated at the time of the offence
- * Victims were on average 37.9 years old
- * 23.8% of victims were domestic abuse related

Pendle Profile 2021

- * Pendle has a higher than Lancashire average repeat victimisation rate
- * Pendle has a higher than average rate of deaths from drug misuse
- * **6th highest cost of crime in 2020 in Lancashire at £49.9m (£542 per resident)**

Pendle MATAC Trends 2022

- * All crime in Pendle has increased by 6% (up 412 offences) for the fiscal year 2021/22 compared to the previous year. By comparison, East recorded a 15.6% increase and Lancashire an 18.6% increase.
- * Six crime categories have recorded increases, burglary and robbery offences recorded decreases, whilst arson & criminal damage, possession of weapons and vehicle offences recorded a similar volume of crime in both years.
- * Violence against the person offences continue to be the main crime type with 45.9% of all crime in the Pendle area. This is followed by theft offences (14.4%) and arson and criminal damage offences (12.0%).
- * Burglary has recorded a 27.1% reduction in offences in the most recent year compared to the previous year, down 135 offences.

Pendle MATAC 2021/22

- * Pendle recorded 1,425 offences that were domestic abuse related (19.5% of all crime). This was a 0.6% increase on the previous year (up 9) where 1,416 domestic abuse related offences were recorded (20.5% of all crime).
- * Pendle recorded 3,771 ASB incidents, which is a 35.7% reduction (down 2,094) on the previous FY 20/21 (Covid period) but a 30.7% increase (up 886) on FY 19/20 (pre Covid). East FY recorded a 34.7% reduction from last year (20/21) and a 21.3% increase on FY 19/20 (pre Covid).
- * For April 2020 to March 2021, 19.2% of all ASB recorded in Pendle was youth related. This has increased to 24.0% of all ASB for April 2021 to March 2022.
