CAPITAL PROGRAMME 2022/23

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To update members on the Committee's capital budget.

RECOMMENDATION

- (1) That members note all of the budget is committed.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

To enable the capital programme to be allocated effectively.

6. Committee Members are reminded that, as outlined in the Capital Programme and Strategy 2018/21 report to the Council on Thursday 22nd February 2018, only items of a capital nature can be funded from the area committee budgets. As such all bids must be reviewed by Financial Services prior to their inclusion on the agenda for each meeting so as to determine whether the bids are capital or revenue. If not reviewed beforehand, bids will need to be ratified as capital expenditure at a later date and agreement to allocate funds will need to be made at the following meeting.
7. Bids for funding should be submitted on the May 2018 revised forms (Form A for internal bids, Form B for external bids and Form C for Ward Initiatives) so that they can be evaluated on a consistent basis. Please refer to the financial implications section of this report.

New/Deferred Bids

8. PBC Environmental Services - £121 to purchase and erect dog bin at King Street Terrace, Brierfield (appendix 2).
9. No late bids or funding allocations are to be made unless, with the consent of the Chairman, the bid is considered to be an urgent item. If a late/urgent bid is approved and is in the opinion of the Chief Finance Officer a revenue item then the decision will be reported to the Policy and Resources Committee for determination. No payment will be made in respect of the bid pending a resolution by the Policy and Resources Committee.

Existing Bids

Underspend – Deallocate Funding

10. Walverden Environmental Improvements (appendix 1, scheme 22) – scheme completed. Request £1,248 underspend is deallocated.

IMPLICATIONS

Policy: The capital programme is required to be allocated and managed in accordance with the Council's Corporate Capital Strategy 2018/21.

Financial: Expenditure for capital purposes is primarily expenditure on the acquisition, reclamation or enhancement of assets (eg buildings, land, plant and machinery). "Enhancement" means substantially lengthening the useful life of the asset, substantially increasing its open market value or substantially increasing the use of the asset. Other expenditure for capital purposes can include computer costs (for use over a period exceeding one year) and incidental costs involved in a

capital project (eg officers' salaries and professional fees). Anything not covered by "proper practices" (Section 21(2) of the Local Government Act 2003) must be treated as revenue expenditure. Under no circumstances can the capital allocation be used to fund revenue expenditure.

A list of good practice in the allocation of funding has been proposed by the Council's Chief Finance Officer in order to assist members when considering the allocation of the capital budgets. The list is as follows:

1. The funding should assist a scheme which contributes to meeting the Council's corporate priorities.
2. Allocate reasonable amounts to projects early to allow for effective planning and implementation.
3. Look for opportunities to maximise the effectiveness of the allocation through match funding.
4. Consider allowing some contingency for projects that may be presented during the year.
5. Try to avoid allocation of funds at the end of the financial year.
6. Consider the revenue consequences of capital schemes in terms of ongoing cost.

Legal: There are legal implications for a number of the proposals listed above in terms of necessary permissions, agreements and possible long-term liabilities and responsibilities.

Risk Management: The capital programme is required to be allocated and managed in accordance with the Council's policies and procedures. The proper management of the programme is intended to minimise any exposure to unnecessary risk associated with the programme and the individual schemes within it.

Health and Safety: The implementation of the programme has associated risks in terms of health and safety. The Council is required to meet all relevant legal requirements for the effective management of health and safety risk and has policies and procedures in place to ensure health and safety standards are maintained.

Climate Change: Some of the schemes identified will encourage the reduction of carbon emissions, such as traffic calming schemes and cycle facility provision.

Community Safety: A number of the schemes listed above have implications in terms of community safety. Wherever possible, the projects are managed in a way that enhances community safety.

Equality and Diversity: The capital programme is required to be allocated and managed in accordance with the Council's policies and procedures, including those relating to equality and diversity.

Brief details of project: Current post mounted litter bin situated on post next to the grit bin at the bottom of King St Terrace, opposite Holden Road, is not sufficient for the amount of dog poo bags being placed in it, we recommend the erection of a dog bin, back to back with the litter bin, to cope with demand.
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F. Main outcomes to be achieved: A tidier and healthier environment, and the bags will be contained within a lidded dog bin, rather than spilling out of an open, litter bin.
