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# CONFIRMATION OF TREE PRESERVATION ORDER TPO/No3/2023 – ENTRANCE TO BURNT HOUSE FARM, BLACKO

#### PURPOSE OF REPORT

To request Members to confirm Tree Preservation Order, TPO/No3/2023 – Entrance to Burnt House Farm Blacko.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Confirm the Tree Preservation Order (TPO).

# REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

- (1) The trees are an attractive group that line the driveway to the farm, the owner is concerned about impact due to potential development on land adjacent.
- (2) The trees make a positive contribution to the character of the area and would be important for screening purposes in the event of any development on the land adjacent.
- (3) The tree evaluation system used to determine suitability for a Tree Preservation Order found the trees to be suitable for protection.

#### **ISSUE**

- 1. A request for a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) was made by the owner of Burnt House Farm as there is concern about tree root and branch damage in the event of development happening on land adjacent.
- 2. There has a been a planning application recently for the land in question that was refused, the farm owner is concerned that another application will be forthcoming.
- 3. Prior to seeking consent to raise a TPO, the Council's Environment Officer visited the site and completed a 'Tree Evaluation Method for Preservation Orders' assessment (TEMPO). This method, developed by a Registered Consultant of the Arboricultural Association, is a systematised assessment tool and has been widely used across the arboricultural profession.
- 4. The TEMPO assessment scored relatively highly (see Appendix 2) and deemed the remaining trees as suitable for the making of a TPO.
- 5. The concerns are that roots and branches encroach into the site adjacent and could be compromised at any time.
- 6. The TPO was put in place and a period of 28 days has been allowed for objections to the order to be raised. No objections have been received.
- 7. Under the Council's Constitution the Officer requires the consent of Councilors in order to confirm a Tree Preservation Order and make it permanent.

#### **IMPLICATIONS**

**Policy:** Paragraph 8.46 of the Pendle Local Plan Part 1: Core Strategy states:

'The landscape character of the borough will be protected especially in the open countryside.'

**Financial:** None arising directly from this report.

**Legal:** The Council have powers to make a Tree Preservation Order under the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation)(England) Regulations 2012.

Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 requires Local Authorities and Government Departments to have regard to the purposes of conserving biodiversity in a manner that is consistent with the exercise of their normal functions such as policy and decision-making. Conserving biodiversity may include enhancing, restoring or protecting a population or habitat.

Risk Management: None arising directly from this report.

**Health and Safety:** The trees are an overall healthy condition and do not pose a threat to health and safety over and above the risk any healthy tree poses.

Sustainability: The trees contribute to sustainability in several ways these include:

• Supporting the biodiversity of the area.

- Remove carbon dioxide and particular matter from the air.
- Uptake large amounts of water from the ground.


